Real Life Leader

An Interview with Allison Heaney, President of Skaggs-Walsh

Judy Garber: Tell us a little about yourself. How did you progress in your career?

Allison Heaney: I began my career by washing trucks at the very young age of 5, stuffing envelopes at age 8 and cleaning and tuning oil burners at age 14. I joined the company full-time in June of 1991 and was placed in the sales department and then quickly promoted to sales manager. This was the last place I ever wanted to be in! However, I learned to telemarket, generate leads, sell leads to homeowners, and eventually train and manage other salespeople. This position was difficult for me but also taught me some valuable lessons. I had always been shy, and sales taught me that everyone feels awkward in a new situation and that if you work to make it more comfortable for yourself, you end up setting everyone at ease. Unfortunately, I progressed to the next level of President just three years later due to my father's illness. At 24 years of age, I was not ready to lead our companies, but I did manage to cope and learn what I needed while on the job. I have been running our family of companies for almost 30 years! Yikes where does the time go?

Garber: What skills have you found especially helpful along the way?

Heaney: I often marvel at people who have talent. I like to say that I was born without talent which caused me to develop a strong work ethic. I believe that determination coupled with a refusal to believe that there isn't anything that I cannot do has helped me build a business and a life of which I am proud.

Garber: As an Owner and President of your company, how would you describe your style of leadership?

Heaney: I attempt to lead others by example. There is no job in my company that I am unwilling to do. If a truck needs to be moved, a boiler serviced, a phone call needs to be answered or the dishes need washed, I am ready to pitch in and get the job done. I try to surround myself with others who have a similar dedication to serving our customer base.

Garber: What do you believe is the biggest challenge for a leader today?

Heaney: Adapting to the supersonic speed of advancements in technology. As a relatively low-tech person, I have trouble integrating existing technology and I can't imagine what the future will look like. Artificial intelligence confuses and amazes me. I know that my generation has seen some of the greatest changes in all of history and my children's generation will see that change on steroids. It is so difficult to ensure that you stay relevant to customers.

Garber: I know that that you recently added Pest Control to your basket of customer offerings. How challenging was that to?

Heaney: Yes, this is a start up business for us. I have made over 32 acquisitions of heating oil, plumbing, HVAC and Electrical companies over the last 30 years, but this is the first to start from scratch. It is fun and exciting. I just completed my online Structural Pest and Rodent class and passed my DEC exam. I am a certified pest technician! I certainly did not see this coming even 5 years ago. The changes in the Biofuel industry and continuing pressures from government to move away from fossil fuels have forced me to look outside for ways to keep our family business relevant to our customers. It seems that there is a great need for pest control!

Garber: What is the most important risk you took and why?

Heaney: In 1996, I purchased Manhattan and Queens Fuel Oil which was a fairly large company. They had nine drivers and seven service technicians who seemed extremely concerned when they found out

that I had purchased the company. Despite a rocky start, we were able to maintain many of the relations with their customers and still have quite a few of them today. It was the toughest acquisition I have ever made by also the most rewarding. My customers service manager, Donna Nunez and my assistant service manager Lydia Quijano both came from that company, and both are important members of our team today.

Garber: What is one piece of advice you can share with others about considering a move into leadership or take over ownership of a company? What might they encounter that they aren't prepared for?

Heaney: Trust yourself! That is the most important piece of advice that I can give to anyone in business or at home. We all have a voice inside that tells us what we should and should not do. Listen to it! There will always be people to tell you what you can and cannot do, and they are usually wrong. Trust your inner voice and follow your own counsel. When I follow my own advice, I am unstoppable.
